Curriculum Corporation has a 1800 number for schools requiring assistance/advice on the use of SCIS products. The service is a FREE call for schools.

The helpline is usually staffed by 2 people but users must be prepared to be rung back by the Information Services staff, as often the demand will exceed the supply.

If helpline staff are unable to take your call please leave a message with Reception detailing the nature of the request/ problem. Helpline staff will ring you back as soon as possible.

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Tasmania the Australian *benchmark*

Tasmania has become the Australian *benchmark* for servicing information needs efficiently and cost effectively through a statewide network. Belinda Flowers writes from Hobart on *Tasmania logging in.*

Tasmanian schools are in the fortunate position of having access to a statewide education based, wide area network. This network was developed in the late 1970's and available to all schools free of charge. Access is via either dedicated lines or by dialup modem for the cost of a local call.

There are two major uses of this communications network.

1. TALIS the Tasmanian Automated Library and Information System, is an online information system that unites school and public libraries across Tasmania in a common network and a shared database. It is the largest network of its kind in the southern hemisphere and links 132 separate libraries, including public and reference libraries, all TAFE and Senior Secondary Colleges, most high schools and over 40 primary and district schools across the state. The long term aim is to have all public, TAFE and schools libraries using TALIS thus providing comprehensive access to publicly purchased resources in Tasmania.

Libraries connected to TALIS have access to:

- Dynix library management system
- Tasmanian Index of Community Organizations (TICO)
- Tasmanian Index articles on Tasmania drawn from newspapers and magazines
- Events Calendar a calendar of cultural
- activities/events statewide

• Fast Facts - a database of commonly asked reference questions

Access to the resources on TALIS is provided to non-participants, both libraries and individuals, via **dial-up public access catalogues.**

This easy access to the **combined resources** of all agencies within the Department of Education, Community and Cultural Development has given schools a much wider resource base to

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support curriculum delivery than would be the norm for stand-alone libraries. The ready access to material in the public and reference libraries encourages students to search more widely for relevant information.

Being a shared database that is maintained centrally, schools are provided with **free training** and **support** and do not have any of the system maintenance tasks normally associated with an automated library system. Minimum cataloguing effort is required by the schools with public libraries, schools and TAFE using the same bibliographic records.

2. TasNET is a network established and maintained by the Department of Education, Community and Cultural Development and available free of charge to any school with a modem or dedicated line. It contains the AAP database (schools pay a yearly fee) and a full range of Internet tools including Email, Gopher, Telnet, FTP and World Wide Web. Whilst use of the Internet is free, there are some drawbacks in that the service to many schools is text-only, and thus the graphics and colour that make the Web in graphical form so appealing, are missing. A limited number of schools have ISDN access and it is hoped to extend this service, which would provide full graphical Internet access, within the next few years.

The access to **e-mail** is particularly valued by the schools as a means of communication with other schools and educators throughout the world. Many incorporate this within their teaching programs encouraging student to student contact.

SCIS and its con

The SCIS database and services are unique world wide and its continued success is reliant on the efficiency of each State Agency.....

While their prime function is to input cataloguing data, Agency personnel are also involved in the development of SCIS products. Each school has the right of access to *Voyager* via the digital communication network *Sprintnet* for the cost of a local phone call through their State agency.

Each Agency comes under the State Education Department and provides similar services dependent on their individual internal organisation and the personnel available.

The Open Access Support Centre (OASC) - the Queensland Agency for SCIS is one of the Queensland Department of Education's three statewide support centres. Curriculum support is provided to Queensland's educational community through the development of a range of resources and services which have a preschool to year 12 focus.

The **Centre's** main goal is to enable all learners to access education at a time, place and pace in a form which best suits their circumstances and requirements. The Centre is also the Queensland **Agency for SCIS**. There is direct connection to the SCIS database situated at Ferntree in Melbourne through a dedicated line. This enables 24 hour access without the necessity to dial-up each time the librarians wish to catalogue onto, or search the system.

Sending and Receiving Emails via SCISLINK and KEYLINK

SCIS Online Subscribers have included with their subscription a complimentary subscription to the KEYLINK electronic mail system of Telstra.

When schools are configuring their SCISLINK software, they are asked to key in a MAIL ID i.e. *SCIS123456*, and Password, *infoserv*. This is each schools' KEYLINK address and password. Once entered into the configuration files of SCISLINK, schools using KEYLINK do not have to re-enter this information to access KEYLINK to send and receive e-mail. SCISLINK also gives schools the ability to compose these messages <u>offline</u>, then connect to KEYLINK via the SEND MAIL option in the SCISLINK *CONNECT* menu box.

To Send Mail to another SCIS online user, select the Messages, Create, option of SCISLINK and in the **To** section, type in the KEYLINK User Number, i.e. to send a mail message to School Number, 312346, in the **To** area on the **Message** form type, *SCIS312346*.

If you want to keep a copy of the message, in the **Copy** section of the address, send a copy to yourself by typing in your own KEYLINK User Number, i.e. if your school's user number is SCIS312498, then enter that number in the copy section.

After typing the message, highlight send and enter, and the message will be put into the *OUTTRAY* on the SCISLINK main menu screen. To send this message to the other SCIS user, just open the *CONNECT* menu, highlight *Send Mail*, then enter. SCISLINK will automatically connect to KEYLINK, send the mail and logoff.

The Agency operates within a section of the Centre - Open Learning Library Services (OLLS), that occupies Floors 4 and 5 of Gabba Towers in Woolloongabba, Brisbane. The Curriculum Library within OLLS has three librarian positions and a Senior Librarian, who are all SCIS accredited. They catalogue onto SCIS as part of their many duties, which include reference services, inter-library loans and project collaboration across the Centre.

The Agency adds around 90 records per month to the database. The librarians contribute to the regular national teleconferences on SCIS standards for the database, especially subject heading additions and modifications. All Queensland schools are able to send in suggestions and requests to the Agency to ensure that Queensland curriculum requirements are addressed and to enable Queensland schools to be confident that subject heading access through the SCIS Subject Heading List reflects their needs.

The Agency also offers a SCIS original cataloguing service to Queensland schools. If, after searching the SCIS database they cannot find a bibliographic record, they may send in the resource and staff will catalogue onto the database. This enables all schools to benefit from the national standards. The school bears postage in and the Agency bears postage back, without any other charges.

The Agency is the operational arm of SCIS representation in the Department. On matters of policy collaboration with the Senior Policy Officer - Resources, in the Effective Learning and Teaching Unit of Studies Directorate it is a vital component that provides Queensland schools with an effective Agency service. Both areas meet regularly and participate in the SCIS standards teleconferences.

The Department has an ongoing commitment to the SCIS national database and SCIS services and products. Queensland teacher-librarians and teachers-in-charge of resource centres are encouraged to utilise SCIS and thus take advantage of the national standards of cataloguing that are world class and achieved through close collaboration across all states.

mail to be sent to another User if you select the *process mail* Option within the *CONNECT* menu, SCISLINK will connect to KEYLINK, send your mail and collect any mail in your mail box, logoff and enable you to read your mail offline.

SENDING MAIL to and RECEIVING MAIL from INTERNET Addresses via KEYLINK

Keylink can send and receive mail from other Users who have Internet Email addresses.

To **SEND** to these schools, teacher/librarians, all you need to do is to know their Internet address and Add that to your SCISLINK Address book, within the *FILE* menu.

For example to **Send Mail** to a school or teacher librarian with the Internet address of jjones@ osemale.edu.au via KEYLINK.

In the ADDRESS BOOK create the following address: (Site:aarnet, "rfc-822":<jjones (a)osemale.com.au>)

To access this address when creating a Mail message, after selecting **Create** and opening the message screen, click on **Address**, highlight the address you wish to send to, then press enter. The Internet address will be inserted into the **To** area of the address.

To **RECEIVE** mail from an Internet Email service, just give the following address to the other user and they will then be able to send mail via the Internet to your school.

Assuming that your KEYLINK user number is *SCIS312493*

Give the following address to the Internet user to enable that school to send Emails to your school. /PN=scis312493/O=CURRICULUM. CORP/@telememo.au The school can insert this into their **Address** book and then when they wish to send messages to you or your school use this address.

Although the initial addressing is long, once you have added these into your address book you will not have to re-type the address each time you wish to send to the other user and also by using your subscription to KEYLINK you have saved your school money by not having to pay out for another subscription to an Internet provider to enable you to send and receive Internet Emails.

Professional development and upgrading is on the agenda for New Zealand school librarians as Rosa-Jane French reports from Christchurch.

School librarians along with their teaching colleagues are beginning to accept the four term year, which became national in New Zealand this year. Many of us felt we were trying to fit the usual 14 weeks of work into our first short term of just 10 weeks! However, we enjoyed the longer break over Easter when the weather was pleasant.

In February the School Library Network Annual General Meeting was held for the last time in Christchurch, the Executive Committee is now in Dunedin. The new Secretary is Jenny Carroll, Librarian at Queen's High School (queenshs@deep south.co.nz). The new committee is organising a day programme to fit in with the New Zealand Library and Information Association conference to be held in Oueenstown at the end of September. The theme of the main conference is Information at Work and Dale Spender will be one of the plenary speakers. There will also be sessions on issues such as information literacy and the virtual library. Meanwhile Catherine Thomas, immediate past secretary of the School Library Network will be attending the International Association of School Librarianship Conference in Jamaica in July.

On a smaller scale, Christchurch school librarians have organised a

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professional development day in June. We will hear of new course developments in training for librarians from the Wellington School of Library Studies which will enable students to extend their qualifications from the present Certificate to a Diploma, with possible links into Degree courses. Another session that day will look at the needs of Asian students in our school libraries, both resident migrants and students here for short term language courses.

There are a variety of courses available at local and national levels for librarians and teacherlibrarians. Some are formal and long term whilst others are short term and arranged on a needs basis. Courses are offered by a variety of providers, especially the National Library centres and Colleges of Education, but also commercial companies. It is not always easy to keep in touch with all the possibilities, but the picture is one of challenge - there is always something new to learn.

Rosa-Jane French Rangi Ruru Girls' School, Christchurch

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A group of teacherlibrarians and teachers from Canada have published a great resource for schools world wide!

'Winners: a collection of cooperatively developed teaching units for resource-based learning' contains thirty-seven tried and tested resource-based units of study all intended to provide ideas for teachers and T/Ls to apply to their own situation. Each unit includes general and specific goals and objectives, the planning process, lists resources, has instructional strategies, provides evaluation procedures and some even suggest introductory lessons. There are several Units for each grade level year one through to year twelve, and while each unit may have been prepared for a specific level most can be adapted for younger or older students. The Units are also cross-curricular and secondary maths teachers who haven't visited the resource centre recently might well be encouraged through the Unit: 'Pythagorean partners: a mathematical reseach activity', a single lesson library assignment for Year 9.

"Tucker Box" provides a forum for practising educators to share curriculum knowledge, work plans, ideas and experiences via the *Internet* through a project funded by the Queensland Department of Education.

The *homepage* has three aspects - **Departments** which contains regular features from the editor, weekly 'surprises' and a suggestions box; **Articles** has items contributed by teachers and school personnel and **Out of the Box** highlights special contributions beyond the school environment. DDC 21

For example: SCIS - Accounts, ASCISRECON, Voyager, SCIS ON DISC, etc.
